the newsletter I couldn't write

Ok, friend, lets just jump to the meat of it for a moment:

I tried, several times, to write this newsletter in the last few years and then, well...my life fell apart.

Early January of 2020 I fell in Love with Bunny Mae Walthuis. Then Covid lockdown two months in, followed by her cancer diagnosis six months in, followed by a terminal cancer diagnosis, followed by her death on February 6, 2022....

And now, I'm writing "the newsletter I couldn't write" because moving forward feels better than being stuck in coping mode, because today is a date I have been staring down on the calendar; the day when Bunny would be dead the same amount of time that I had with her on the planet. That being two years and one month.





Now back to the beginning:

Hello.

It's been a minute since I've done a Newsletter.

Several years at least ...

But, if you need a refresher, here's how you may know me;

- Northern California (Humboldt County) again since (2018-Present)
- Bunny's partner (since 2020)
- Montreal-based with segments in Sundance, Vermont and the Hudson Valley (2014-2018)
- NYC 2.0 and filmmaking endeavors (Girls Who Smoke, Dear Emma,) (2007-1014)
- Or perhaps before that, in Australia studying film at VCA (2006)
- Or Humboldt time #1, back in 2001-2005

There have been a lot of chapters, but since Bunny passed (since she was terminal really) I have been in (what I call) "Part 2" of my life. What my grief group calls "The Tribe of After"

Here, if it is of interest, is the **obituary** I wrote for Bunny.

I want to talk with you more, about grief and loss, and how I'm changed and how I see others more, and differently... and about the projects that are coming up for me, which are about this- a documentary and a memoir. But it will be days more before I hit "send" on this letter if I do that. So I'll leave it at- this can be Part 1 Newsletter- of which I am predicting seasonal ones to come out, usually around the equinoxes and solstices. But do watch the 15-minute film (or rewatch if it's been a few years!) before joining us on the Panel Discussion March 9th.


